IRIScan Book 2 Executive Portable Scanner ~ a Useful Tool for Genealogists



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Introduction

This presentation will describe IRIScan Book 2 Executive hand scanner for PC and Mac.



Introduction

My reasons for adding this tool to my collection, and recommending it for travelling genealogists, include its portability, file transfer via bluetooth to computer & tablet, file transfer from the included MicroSD card to iPad or computer, and the use of Readiris OCR software that comes bundled with the product.

Features

- Slide the well balanced scanner with one finger across the document, up to A4 format
- Share via Bluetooth to PC, Mac, Android tablet, Smartphone
- Converts your scans into editable text and PDF using Readiris 12
- Scan text, monochrome or colour, 300 or 600 dpi
- Integrated rechargeable battery
- Windows 8, 7, Vista, XP or 2000, and Mac OS 10.5 (Intel processor) or higher

- Maximum scanning speed for A4-size documents:
 - Colour high resolution: 8 seconds

Uses for the Genealogist

- During a Sunday afternoon visit to Aunt Bessie's home, she remembers that there is a family bible with Birth, Marriage & Death pages between the Old & New Testaments.
- Cousin George found a stack of family trees and hand written notes.
- Gramma Ella May has found a shoebox of photos, and albums with newspaper clippings.
- * At a municipal, provincial or national archives you have come across family files or books of interest.
- * There are more, to be sure......

Uses for the Genealogist

- You don't have your computer and flatbed scanner with you, but you have the IRIScan tucked away in your shoulder bag.
- * Dealing with any of Aunt Bessie's newly discovered treasures is not a problem. However, the Flip-Pal scanner is a better choice for snapshots & newspaper clippings that fit within the 4"x6" format.
- * You may wish to get permission from the archives staff to use your scanner. The excuse I have been given is that the light from scanners could damage the documents. But there is no problem with them making photocopies, for a fee. The light intensity from any handheld or flatbed scanner is far less than any commercial photocopier. We'll have to live with this discrepancy.

That your Setitioner is the Widow of the late Edward Rayner the Townser of Township Rumber 19 aforesaid, Farmer deceased Intestate, and who died possessed of about Seventy acres of leasehold Land, and personal Chattels besides of the value of Sixty five Pounds Currency or thereabouts as Your Petitioner believes and also left Dire Children living with your Petitioner the eldest of whom is in the fourturth Tear of his age . -That Your Petitioner is desirous of administering to her said late Sousband's Estate, and is ready to give Security, as in such cases is required by Law, May it therefore please Your Sooner to grant Letters of administration to your Petitioner on her said late Sbustand's Estate And Your Petitioner (as in duty bound) will ever prayer, March 1042.

Part of an article from The Loyalist Gazette, thought to be of interest to one of our TMG Users Group members. I scanned the page and E-mailed it to him.

A Loyalist Gift to a Queen

Prepared by George Anderson UE, based on information by Frank Cooper UE, a Past Dominion President. Both are descendants of Philip and Maria Elizabeth Barbara Empey.

hadeus Empey, the son of Jacob William Empey and Mary Rombough of Osnabruck Township, Stormont, Ontario, was born on 24 May 1830. Thadeus was the grandson of the Loyalist, William Empey UE and his wife, Eve Von Hildenbrandt. He was also the great grandson of the Loyalist, Phillip Empey UE and his wife, Maria Elizabeth Barbara Schults. Both Phillip and William served in the King's Royal Regiment of New York. Thadeus Empey's great-grandmother, Maria Elizabeth Barbara, was brutally assaulted and beaten by the Rebels and then abandoned on the High Road near Schenectady, New York, during the American Revolution. She died a few days later from her injuries.

The 15 February 1901 issue of the Cornwall Standard, Cornwall, Ontario, indicates that "George. E. Miller of Morrisburg had the pleasure to run across Thadeus M. Empey while travelling as a commercial traveller through the American West. George indicated that no other man is better or more favourably known throughout the Pacific States and territories than Thadeus Empey. His anecdotes and descriptions of the ups and downs of the careers of others as well as himself would make a very large sized book were it put into print."

Thadeus left Dickinson's Landing for California on 24 March 1854. First he went to New York City. From there he took the steamer North Star to the Isthmus of Panama. He crossed the Isthmus to Aspinwall and then went by the steamer Yankee Blade to San Francisco. He was then in every important mining camp in California, Nevada, Arizona and along the Pacific coast.

Queen Victoria was born on 24 May 1830, the same day as Thadeus Empey. The 30 January 1901 issue of *The Arizona Republican*, Phoenix, Arizona, gives the following correspondence between Thadeus Empey and Queen Victoria's secretary:

"Tombstone Arizona May 10th 1865

Sir - Being a Canadian born and a loyal subject of the Most Gracious Majesty and having the good fortune to appear on this mundane sphere on May 24th 1830, I take the liberty specially at the present juncture of affairs in general of expressing my loyalty to and affection for my sovereign by forwarding to you for presentation to Her Majesty a small silver brick made from the ores of Tombstone mining district and earnest wish her that the birthday of my Queen will not be forgotten even in far off Arizona and wish my fervent prayer that Her Majesty may be spared to witness many anniversaries on our natal day. With every sentiment for respect I remain your most obedient humble servant.

Thadeus Empey

The Right Hon. Sir Henry Ponsoby Windsor Castle"

The reply reads as follows:

"Buckingham Palace June 5th 1865

Sir I am commanded by the Queen to thank you for the kind expressions contained in your letter, and for the silver brick which you have presented to Her Majesty. I have the honour to be.

Sir, Your obedient servant Henry Ponsoby

Thadeus M. Empey Esq. Tombstone Arizona, United States of America."

Thadeus Empey kept this treasured correspondence securely locked up in his safe only showing it to a few select friends. After he died on 29 January 1901 in Phoenix, Arizona, a letter from his only surviving sibling. Sidney Empey.

SUSABILAR WALLACE CANNON

(AUNT HANGAH)

Susana Wallace daughter of John Wallace and Sarah (Stapley) Wallace, born in 1818 in Richmond Mills, P.F.1. Married Samuel Cannon on January 31, 1843. Samuel was born May 18, 1819 in St Eleanors, P.E.I. and was the son of George Cannon and Elizabeth (Hiscock) Cannon. He was a shoemaker. They had ten children; Elizabeth, Sarah, (George, Fanny, John, Twins Joseph and Samuel) Joseph, Charlotte and Emma. After their marriage they went to live in Lot 4, Kildare Road, Alberton. On April 4, 1857 their home was destroyed by fire and burned to the ground. Five of their children perished in the blaze. The following is taken from their tombstone in the Dock (Presbyterian) Commetery in Alberton.

In Memory of

George - Died April 4, 1857 age 10 yrs 6 mos Fanny - Died April 4, 1957 age 6 yrs 3 mos John - Died April 4, 1867 age 4 yrs 8 mos Joseph & Samuel (Twins) Died April 4, 1857 age 1 yr 7 mos Children of Samuel and Susannah Cannon

An account of the fire appeared in the newspaper, "The Islander", dated April 10, 18:7. Meleneholy and Distressing Accident A most melancholy accident, attended with loss of life, occurred in the neighbourhood of Cascumpec on Saturday night last. The dwelling of Samuel Cannon, Shoemaker, a poor man, living on the Kildare Road, was destroyed by fire, together with all his furniture, tools, and clothes of the family. It appears that the parents left home a short time before the fire broke out, to visit some relatives living about a mile or no away, leaving the house in charge of the two oldest children, a girl of twelve years and a boy of ten-the remainder four in number, being in bed. The two left in charge, becoming weary, retired to rest, and had scarcely fallen asleep when they were awakened by the flames which were curling round their beds. The girl succeeded in effecting her escape by the door, and opening the window endeavored to assist her brother out, but, becoming confused by the smoke and flames, he sank on the floor, and, with the four young children, was consumed with the building. The girl, though badly burned and in a state of nudity, succeeded in reaching a neighbour's house on foot, where she now lives, and little hopes are held of her recovery from the effect of the fire and exposure. A spectator describes the scene as heart rending when the parents reached the burning ruins and learned the calamity that had befallen them. The mother could scarcely be restrained from rushing into the flames in search of her offspring and it required the strong arms of two men to prevent her. The remains of the children were found the following day, literally burned to cinders. The parents by this calamity are reduced to great poverty and charitably disposed persons in Ch'town as well as in the neighbourhood, will, it is hoped, contribute something for their relief. Contributions will be received at Mr. C. T. Haszard's Book Store.

Another version of this fire was told by William N. Waldron of Tyne Valley a nephew of Aunt Hannah. Hannah had received a letter with news about her sister Elizabeth (Betsy Wallace) Barlow's serious illness. She and Sam started to drive to Ellerslie. They had gone a short way when looking back saw a glow in the sky. Fearing the worst they burned around and drove as fast as they could to their home only to find their house in flames and the children trapped inside. It was all the neighbours could do to prevent Hamenh from trying to rescue them. It appears

Readiris 12 OCR (Optical Character Recognition) software is included with the scanner. You can use it with any scanner. You can scan from Readiris or import a scanned file into Readiris.

The following example is a page from a tightly bound book. The IRIScan Book 2 was scanned from the binding to the outside edge of the page. Readiris settings included Detect Page Orientation and Page Deskewing.






The initial display of the scanned image, following rotation and deskewing.

File Transfer

The above examples were scanned at 600dpi, monochrome. They were then transferred to computer via Bluetooth.

The following illustrates transfer to an iPad. Bluetooth is not supported, but transfer directly from the MicroSD card is a simple process.






At the close of today's talk I was asked if I had used this scanner for photographs. Until now, my only experience has been with documents.

All three were scanned in colour at 600dpi. They appear in the next three slides.


