Windows 10



- TMG 9.05 runs fine on Windows 10 Preview 10030 - Don Ferguson
- In Windows 10 (64 bit), the Wholly Genes PDF does not work when running as a normal user but works fine when TMG is run as an Administrator. Generating the report directly to PDF will not work. However, sending the report to 'Printer' and selecting the 'Microsoft Print to PDF' printer does work and appears to produce very similar if not identical results. – Wade Oram

TMG Printing



- Lee Hoffman:
 - Most reports may be generated to most output file types. Only the box-type reports are limited to Visual ChartForm (VC2) formatted files and to JPG or BMP format image files.
 - There may also be some additional restrictions depending on the Output Types which are not selected by the user in Preferences=>Program Options. But, again, these limits are user-selected and not program limited.

PDF Printing

- I've been using both CutePDF (freeware) and Nitro Pro 8 (came on my Lenovo) to create PDFs. CutePDF acts as a printer, so is transparent to any program.
- I just created about 18m of box charts for a family reunion, all in 508m-wide pages to be printed on a plotter, and that worked fine.
- I used to use PDFCreator, but I couldn't work out how to get page settings for a plotter. For CutePDF this is no problem.

Merge Data Sets

- I have just merged two projects, so now I have two data sets in the 'new' project. I'm trying to merge the two data sets. But the merge button on the Data Set Manager page is grayed out. The data set of the project I want to 'erase' & merge in has a lock on it.
- Lee Hoffman: You may not merge a locked data set. Remove the lock and the Merge button will be active again

History Research Environment (HRE) Project

- A group of about 40 interested persons have been discussing the HRE (History Research Environment) project for about 8 months now. The intention is to provide an application that is different from, but acts an extension of, the TMG data model. There has been much discussion particularly about how to remove some of the perceived limitations within the TMG model. Most of these constraints are a legacy of the original DOS-based, small-memory size 1993 design that was converted to Windows in later versions. We have reviewed many messages on TMG-L to identify repeated queries or requests. A large number of fundamental issues are now resolved.
- We are about to pilot test several database and user interface technologies to evaluate the importing of TMG projects, the performance degradation as project sizes increases and their ability to support some desired future goals like concurrent collaborative use. Preservation of TMG concepts and features within this framework is the prime focus of this project. There is a high likelihood that all TMG user data and its use can be preserved. This is because the project is using a new database schema, rather than trying to patch TMG data into a previously developed database that did not have slots for TMG concepts.

HRE Project

- This project is aimed at a wider market. It is not seen as a direct competitor for the lower end user family history market. It is intended to be multi-platform, free and open source once the viability is established. There will be a user learning curve, but many aspects will look familiar to TMG users. It will be at least 18 months before there is a core demo and more months before there is a viable end-user product which includes word-processor formatted reports and large format charts.
- Export to Gedcom will be provided, but there will be some data loss because the Gedcom data model has not suitable representation of HRE data concepts. Multilingual features are being built in from day 1. We have hopes about other extensions but they are still being prioritized.
- We are particularly interested in recruiting volunteers who have skills in GUI, database SQL, application architecture and have skills in portable languages, Java, Python, C and C++. Please contact me if you have such skills and have time to meaningfully contribute to this project. There is a series of contributor meetings during Aug-Sep in Seattle, Boston, London, Wurzburg (Germany)

Reasons for citing your sources

- Properly cited sources shows a degree of professionalism
- You want other people to be able to 'trace' your research steps and confirm your results
- You want people to know what sources you used
- Some people may be able to further their own research based on your research
- People can "see" how diligent and accurate your research is
- People can "trust" your research because you cited your sources

You want to be able to go back to check conflicting information

Now to the nitty-gritty!

- What exactly does “cite your sources” mean?

It means for every fact included in your research (other than facts in general knowledge), you must provide a citation of the source you used to prove that fact.

- What does a source citation contain?

Generally, when you cite a source you indicate exactly **WHERE** you found the information, in enough detail that someone else can find it, **WHEN** you found it, with any additional comments necessary to understand **HOW** you got it or **WHAT** condition it is in

.
